

Algoma Art Society (AAS) Report 2014 Lotte Stellhe and Judy Henderson attended severa

The Algoma Art Society's first event of the year took place at the Art Gallery of Algoma on Friday, January 10th with an Opening Reception and Awards Presentation at the Winter Festival of the Arts Show and Sale. The exhibition ran until Saturday, January 18th. Congratulations went out to members Nora Ann Harrison and Ken Hagerman for receiving Honourable Mentions at this event. Many other Society members participated. An excellent article and photos by Carol Zarudenec Smith on the Winter Festival were featured on Local2 online.

In early 2014 the Algoma Art Society hosted two art workshops using the remainder of City Grant money carried over from 2013.

The first workshop was held on Saturday, January 25th at the Senior Citizen Drop In Centre. Diana Blazek put on a Pan Pastel Workshop for 12 members.

There was no cost but all participants were required to have Pan Pastels. Members worked on two art projects along with learning Pan Pastel application skills and how it performed on various types of pastel papers. Pat Baker who attended did a terrific follow-up Local



News report on the workshop for the Sault Star.

On Saturday, February 22nd and Sunday, February 23rd instructor Gordon MacKenzie put on a watercolour workshop at the Canadian Bushplane Heritage Centre. Members were required to pay half fees and non-members paid full fees. All attending were given a list of required materials. Along with working through the steps involved in producing numerous watercolour landscapes, Gordon talked about Atmosphere and Mood, Levels of Landscape Painting and gave out a list on his 'Thoughts on Painting'. He also displayed watercolour techniques using assorted materials such as sand paper and sponges.

A Spring Art Show and Sale was held in a vacant Station Mall



store on Saturday, April 26th. All members were required to demonstrate. Eight members participated; Doris Anne Ray, Pat Baker, Nancy Caldwell, Judy Henderson, Hilkka Pellikka, Warren Peterson, Zoey Wood-Salomon and Carol Zarudenec Smith. There was a fantastic turn out from the public. We also excellent received publicity through Sault Star articles by Brian Kelly prior to and following the event.

Judy Henderson was thrilled and amazed to find out that she had been chosen as the Featured Artist for the 2014 NOAA Bulletin. She was totally unaware of the behind the scenes work done by Algoma Art Society and NOAA members in collecting photos and information on her. It was truly an unforgettable and great honour to have been selected.

Lotte Steube and Judy Henderson attended several "en plein air" sessions with Gordon MacKenzie in July where we followed him and others to different Lake Superior locations. Gordon offered many helpful "en plein air" hints even though it was without instruction.

Member Doris Anne Ray relocated her gallery entitled 'The Artists Alcove' to a more central location on Queen Street East in November 2013. Our March 2014 meeting was held at her gallery. Doris told members about her new, well lit, more spacious gallery and invited members to display their work, to drop in, socialize and paint along with her. Following that Doris offered her gallery to display the 40 paintings in the 57th NOAA from August 11th to September 11th. Four members had their work accepted in this exhibition. Anne Laidlaw who won the Muriel Backstrom Memorial Award, Marilyn Mills, Hilkka Pellikka, and Lotte Steube who received her NOAA Letters. A YouTube video was shown locally on Shaw Channel 10 where Lotte Steube and Doris Anne Ray were interviewed by Ann Gordonair asking about their work and the 57th NOAA. Our September Society meeting was also held at Doris's gallery so members could get a final view of the 57th NOAA. In October Doris was honourably presented with the Chamber of Commerce Athena Award. Congratulations Doris!

Members partook in several artistically inspiring exhibitions at Alberta House in Sault Michigan. During August Phyllis Dorman participated in a show entitled "Group of 3" in the Mini Gallery and Susan Chow had a solo exhibition entitled "Rocks, Trees and H₂O" in the Olive Craig Gallery. In October Diana Blazek accompanied three other artists in an exhibition of figures and forms entitled "Figuratively Speaking" in the Olive Craig Gallery.

In September NOAA rep Judy Henderson attended the Annual NOAA Meeting and Official Opening of the 58th NOAA in Lively. The Algoma Art Society was thrilled to learn that they had six paintings


Thursday and Friday we were out on location. John gave a demonstration and then everyone worked on painting their chosen site.

Northern Ontario Art Association's 58th Annual Exhibition Convenor Report 2014

The 58th Annual show saw a total of 126 entries from within the participating communities of the NOAA. Receiving day was a beehive day, where the committee and whichever members of the co-hosting clubs volunteered, were kept busy receiving, unpacking, setting up, doing administrative work and whatever else the day brought. Everyone worked well together, not just because this was the duty they were assigned to, but because of their pride in their club, the existence of the NOAA and what it means to Northern Ontario and its artists, and simply pride in the knowledge that such wonderful and varied talent exists in Northern Ontario.

Jurying day was a quieter one. Our jurors were chosen as per the guidelines of the NOAA handbook; one from the area and one from out of the area. Joanne Blais, owner/operator of a local art supply and framing store. B Creative was one of the jurors. Ms. Blais comes from a long career in framing, painting, art, design and graphics and is a great supporter of local art and artists. Mrs. Ona Kingdon, the second juror, hails from Richmond Hill, Ontario. Mrs. Kingdon is well known in national and international art circles, being a successful and well known water-colourist with several awards to her name. several articles in books and magazines in this country and others. I feel that our choice of these jurors, with acceptance from the NOAA Executive, was a successful one where Ms. Blais and Mrs. Kingdon, through their experiences in various branches of art brought a complementary faction to the judging process.

One of the awards received this year was a new one, from an artist supply store in the USA, offered when the proprietor, Joe Miller (Cheap Joe's Art Stuff) saw that Mrs. Kingdon was going to be a juror at our exhibit! Hopefully this gentleman will continue to supply an award annually; next year's host community should keep it in mind!

We currently have a budget of \$1500 for this annual event; although it seems like a sufficient sum, in the last few years, it has been necessary to obtain insurance on our own for various venues; this year we had to pay additional insurance for this venue as well as insurance for the Friday night reception at the Art Gallery of Sudbury. I suggest the executive look at an increase of this budget by 20% which would be another \$300 to pay for insurances on venues if required; however, this extra could also be held in contingency IF the need to pay insurances is

required, and then could be applied for. This would be beneficial to those preparing the committee did a lot of footwork in regards to obtaining sponsors - which kept our expenditures within the allotted budget - financially and in ways of donations of goods and services. I feel that this is important to any community hosting the annual NOAA exhibit. The more you diversify, including other people and businesses in your community, the more support you will receive in any of your endeavours; and we also posted the names of those businesses/individuals that provided that support.

The volunteer aspect for these exhibits – and anything throughout your business year - is imperative to its success. It is also necessary for members to provide their support - in this manner - to their club if they are hosting this event. Through our membership in the NOAA we have the right and the privilege of entering such a prestigious event; remember that this event is happening for YOU...so that you can have your work critiqued and judged by someone whom you may admire, and whose opinion you value; each member also has the opportunity of being selected and having their work on exhibit for a whole year in almost 15 different communities; but putting a show together such as this, I'm sure all of you know, is a lot of work; support from individual members is important. If no one volunteers to assist, over time, things tend to disintegrate...quickly. Your clubs provide opportunities for workshops, education, trips, and exposure to well known and experienced artists, other exhibits to enter...give back a little by offering your assistance, in any way you can, to the NOAA and the Annual Juried Exhibit.

For those who have hosted this exhibit, you know what a whirlwind the days before the opening ceremonies can be. I would like to make a suggestion, to save time and work for those on the committee and preparing the works for jurying - perhaps the choice of work can be made ahead of time by the artist. Another show in Northern Ontario requires the names of the paintings from the artist when registration and payment is submitted. Perhaps this is something to think about for the future, and save a lot of last minute, frantic work by the committee if these labels can be made ahead of time. This is for the consideration of the NOAA executive and board of directors. The deadline for the title of the work to be entered could be as little as the beginning of September, but this extra time

exhibit. Also, as many of you know, the paperwork, administration and preparation for documentation for this exhibit and post exhibit is enormous. With the technology available to us these days, we should be moving forward to put and do a lot of this work with technological support; for instance, submitting photos for judging using digital photographs, judging scores and comments done on laptops or iPads and then run off or e-mailed to participants; we can become almost paperless with the technology available to us at this time.

We came upon a few issues during this year's exhibit that I need to bring to the executive's and representative's attention: on a few occasions we had to contact the NOAA representatives for the clubs because of issues with work being entered: make sure, if you have a change in your NOAA representative, to notify the NOAA executive (secretary) so that the pertinent information or lists can be updated and given to the rest of the NOAA membership for reference.

Secondly, the rules of entry are very clear in the bulletin every year. We found that several works had not been thoroughly checked and cleared by the NOAA representatives, or whomever took in the submitted work; we found frames and mats that were in poor condition and also the rules for hanging wires is clear in the bulletin and a great number of the works had not followed this guideline. These works can be pulled by the convenor and/or the jurors upon inspection.

It has become apparent that the NOAA is made up of several factions:

It is the development of minds; the giving of soul; the sharing of heart; the holding of hands; the nod of approval; the opening of minds; the sharing of experience and knowledge; the ability to reach goals.

The clubs and the members of the NOAA not only strive to achieve these goals for ourselves, but through friendship, support, camaraderie and sharing, make certain our friends and colleagues obtain the same.

This year marks the 58th season that the members of the NOAA have carried this association to another successful and well attended Juried Exhibition.



58th NOAA Show Jurors' Report

I am honoured by the trust placed in me as a juror of the NOAA 2014 exhibition. To those that helped organize the exhibition, a huge thank you. I know from personal experience how much work goes into making an exhibition such as this successful. To everyone who entered, I would like to congratulate you both for your efforts and your courage to enter. Becoming an artist is more than merely the act of making a painting or drawing. A huge portion of our own heart and soul goes into creating a piece of art so submitting it to be juried by another person takes courage and belief in ones own abilities both technically and artistically.

So what was I looking for in each work of art? I look for strong composition, clever use of lighting, value and colour and technical expertise in the chosen medium but I also look for signs of the artist's desire and willingness to push beyond these technical skills in their art. I look for works that demonstrate a willingness to take risks, or that challenges the viewer, for imaginative, creative and unusual approaches to a subject and most importantly for work that clearly comes from the heart of the artist. Final presentation is also an important factor as it demonstrates an artist's respect for their own work and appreciation of how they can enhance the mood of the piece through the way in which it is framed.

To those artist's works that Joanne and I have included in the travelling exhibition I offer a heartfelt congratulations. Without doubt you can be proud to be part of this exhibition. To those who were not included I say to you what I say to myself each time I have a painting rejected. 'Keep believing in your style of work and your way of interpreting the world and remember however objective a juror tries to be, some works of equal skill will resonate more on a personal level for that juror than others so may be chosen. Be open to any suggestions and constructive criticism though. These can often help us grow as artists if we are open to the ideas. I applaud NOAA for creating such a comprehensive evaluation sheet that we were given this year. Both for those artists who had paintings accepted and those who had work rejected this time I hope you will find it useful in helping to both understand how we juried your work and to provide an idea of how you can continue to improve as an artist.

Jurors for the upcoming 59th Annual Juried Exhibition

Artist Kenny Yu

Hung Ching Yu (known as Kenny) is a painter born from Kaiping, in the Guangdong Province of China. Upon high school graduation, from 1974-1975 at 17 years old, Yu has been commissioned to paint large scale murals within the Official Art Club of Wuchuan for the Mao Era Chinese Government. Afterwards, Yu returned to Kaiping until 1979 and painted in the Official Art Club of Kaiping.

Throughout his career in China, Yu has also worked as a set designer where he designed and painted large scale backdrops for performance groups in the Guangdong Province.

In 1980, Hung Ching Yu immigrated to Canada to pursue new opportunities. Upon settling first in Newfoundland, he continued to work in large scale format, having created mural paintings for businesses in Newfoundland. He has participated in the International Art Exhibition in Grand Falls, Newfoundland. In 2014, Hung Ching Yu has created a mural painting for the Laurentian Ski Club in North Bay.

Kenny's medium specialty is painting in acrylic throughout his mural practice in China. He paints in a variety of mediums including Watercolour Painting, Oil Painting, and Chinese Brush Painting. His style is realism.

Joan Ferneyhough

Joan Ferneyhough has owned and operated Joan Ferneyhough Gallery since 1996, representing Canadian artists of distinction. She has a particular interest in artists of Northern Ontario.

Prior to opening Joan Ferneyhough Gallery, Ferneyhough was employed by Ontario Northland Transportation Commission for 31 years, holding various positions of responsibility until early retirement in 1996. While at ONTC and during the period from 1986 – 1996, she helped to establish and managed the company's corporate art collection. as a member of the art acquisition committee she assisted in the acquisition of over five-hundred works of art by artists of northeastern Ontario. During this period, she also oversaw the tendering and installation of two major art-in-architecture projects, including The Station at North Bay and bus station facility in Kirkland Lake.

In addition Ferneyhough has served on several juries and provincial art acquisition committees, adjudicating work and acquiring and commissioning art from various institutions, provincial ministries and agencies in northern eastern Ontario.

She served on the White Water Gallery Board of Directors from 1987-89, on the Art Centre Board of Directors (two years as president and two as the W.K.P. Gallery representative) from 1990 – 1996 and on the Art Gallery of Ontario Board of Trustees from 2004 – 2007.

SHIPPING THE CRATES

- **1.** NOAA Carrier of Choice is **Manitoulin Transport** and NOAA has a preferred rate with this carrier.
- 2. The NOAA account number with Manitoulin Transport is #028655. This number is to be included on all Manitoulin Transport pro bills. When you call Manitoulin Transport to arrange for pickup of your crate, they will require the approximate size and



weight of your crate. Ask them for a rate quote and write the rate quote number on the shipping bill of lading. Request the NOAA Special Rate.

- 3. WHEN SHIPPING THE SELECTED SHOW PREPAID FROM ONE SITE TO ANOTHER, the **NOAA** pays for the **shipping**. Ensure Manitoulin Transport staff **include the NOAA account number** in the PREPAID section of the pro bill. The invoices will be sent to the NOAA Treasurer for payment.
- 4. WHEN SENDING CLUB CRATES TO THE CONVENOR FOR JURYING, the individual club is responsible for the shipping cost both ways. Manitoulin Transport will send the invoice to the NOAA Treasurer. S/he will then send your club an invoice to reimburse NOAA for the shipping charge Please pay this invoice as soon as possible.
- 5. DO NOT INSURE (very costly), but put a TOTAL VALUE of contents of crate on the pro bill.
- 6. Telephone the Receiving Club and advise of shipping date and when they can expect to receive the shipment. Keep a record of where the crates were shipped and when they should be there in case there is a crate lost or the exhibition convener doesn't receive the crate.
- 7. NOTICE TO ALL REPS: The combination locks on the shipping crates are now replaced with carabineers.

Media

All two-dimensional artwork excluding photographs. Note that the annual colour and graphics shows are now combined into one Annual Juried Exhibition.

Time

All work must have been done within the last three years. It must be produced without the assistance of instruction. It must not have previously been exhibited in any of the NOAA exhibitions.

Originality

It must not be a copy in part or as a whole of another's drawing, painting or photograph. Your own photographs may be used as a reference. The use of manipulative photographic images in collage is now accepted.

Size

No minimum size. The maximum size is 33" x 38" framed. Any small entries will be the responsibility of the artist to pack adequately.

Mounting and Framing

There will be no matting limits. It is the responsibility of the art to present entries in such a way the image, mat and frame are a coherent, presentable unit. Pieces with soiled or damaged mats will be withheld from the jurors.

If artists are framing with Plexiglas, it must be noted on the NOAA label to prevent any damage. All matted pieces must be securely framed and glazed for hanging.

Stretched canvas pieces may be submitted without extra framing as long as the edge of the canvas forms an integral part of the painting and the artist provides adequate means of support for transportation.

Note: These pieces should be protected front and back with cardboard, taped together, before being packed in the cloth envelopes. This packing should be labelled with name of Artist and Title of piece so that it is reused to protect the artwork each time it is repacked for travelling.

Framed pieces must have a hanging wire and be securely framed according to framing standards (1/3 way down). No taping of glass for shipping. If possible, use plastic-covered wire.

back to keep sides from bowing and to offer more

Single sheet art pieces may be mounted on board without additional matting if that method of mounting offers the desired result. However, it must be professionally mounted to prevent slipping in the frame.

Diptychs and triptychs will be accepted, and be considered one work, but they must be joined together and the combined size of all pieces must not exceed the maximum allowable size.

NOAA Labels

NOAA labels must be affixed to the back of each submission. These labels are pre-pasted (just moisten and apply). Do not use any tape. If extra labels are needed, make photocopies and apply with glue. Include framed size or dimensions.

Pricina

Before pricing, consider: the NOAA takes 10%; the club or gallery exhibiting your piece at the time of sale is entitled to take their standard commission It is suggested that the minimum price be \$50.

Club Representatives

As representatives it is your responsibility to reject any pieces from your members that do not meet the requirements as indicated in the Rules of Entry.

Official Entry Form

Collect information from your members and fill out the entry forms. Send the original to the Convenor, one copy to the treasurer and two copies to be used as your packing slips for shipping; one to be taped to the inside of the crate lid and the extra in the crate.

If you have more than one crate for your club, make additional copies of the entry form so that you can place two copies of the entry form in each crate. You must indicate on each which paintings are in each crate. Retain a copy for your files.

Have your entry forms to the Convenor by the deadline date.

Entry Fee

An entry fee of \$25 will entitle you to submit one painting. The fee is to be paid to your club representative.

It is not to be submitted to the treasurer on an individual basis.

The club representative will send one cheque on behalf of all club members with the official entry form to the NOAA Treasurer. Do not send individual cheques from each member. Send this in before the deadline.

Packing

Check to make sure each entry delivered to you meets the requirements. Pack the entries in the crate. Use additional packing materials to ensure the entries cannot slide around. Corrugated paper may be sufficient.

Place a copy of the official entry form on the inside of the lid. Tick off the paintings on this list to go with the crate. Place an extra copy of the entry form in the crate.

If all the paintings don't fit in one crate, please indicate which paintings are in the second crate. In the second crate, a photocopy of the official entry form must be taped to the lid with the paintings in this crate ticked off and with the indication that the other paintings are in the first crate. Also put an extra copy in this crate.

Crates

Send the crate to the Convenor PREPAID. The Convenor does not have to accept the shipment unless it is prepaid.

Unselected work will be returned COLLECT to your club after jurying.

Sales

Artists whose paintings are sold during the tour of exhibition will not receive a cheque from NOAA until after the purchase cheque has been cleared and the painting has been delivered to the purchaser. The NOAA will retain 10% on sales and any other percentage taken by galleries

ALL ENTRIES MUST HAVE A CLUB CLOTH ENVELOPE FOR SHIPPING.

Each entry should have its own club envelope with name and address of the club, not the individual artist's name.
