

The year began with well-attended Tuesday Paintina Get-togethers from January to March in the Emmanuel Church Hall. It was an excellent opportunity to paint and learn from each other. Anne Laidlaw's Intro to Pastels Workshop in February was also very motivating and informative.

One of the highlights of 2010 was an exhibition of 18 selected paintings displayed in the Art Gallery of Algoma from March 11 to April 28, 2010. The theme "Synesthesia" provided those entering with thought provoking challenges.

Eddie Kosiba tied for 2nd place for his whimsical "Folk Art Folk" painting in the Alberta Gallery in Sault Michigan in April. Lotte Steube received an Honorable Mention. Several Society members were thrilled to have work accepted in the 33rd LaCloche Art Show in July. Ellen Hadath won 2nd Prize for her acrylic and Judy Henderson won Best Oil. Phyllis Dorman and Ellen also won Honorable Mentions.

Seven members participated in a successful Spring Art Show & Sale in Station Mall April 30th and May 1st. Also several Society artists were fortunate to be invited to participate

in the Finn Grand Fest Art Show held from July 29th to August 1st. The art show was convened by Hilkka Pellikka. Station Mall provided the Art Society with an ideal empty store location to display the 53rd NOAA. This exhibition

provided an excellent opportunity for the viewing public to become aware of the NOAA. Over the three week period in August we welcomed over 700 visitors. Following the NOAA exhibition our

club had a one week display that was also very successful with close to 300 visitors. Excellent publicity was

received during these exhibits in Station Mall and because of it many new local artists showed great interest in joining our Society.

Phyllis Dorman and Lotte Steube had paintings accepted in the 54th NOAA in September. Phyllis was excited to learn that she had won the Coldwell Banker Pine Lakes Realty Award.

Two very informative

guest speakers attended our October and November meetings. Taimi Poldmaa spoke about her Group of 7 Workshop at the McMichael Gallery, Learning to Find Your Own Voice and invited us for a one month show in her gallery. David Read spoke about Plein Air Painting in oil and acrylic and displayed much of the recommended equipment.

In June and December our club had two fun social events. The year ended with our executive appointing a new president, Eileen Halfpenny. Eileen is very motivated and has many new and exciting ideas for the Algoma Art Society in 2011.

The Consolidated Artist Group of 7s has a unique opportunity by collaborating with King's Framing & Art Gallery. In a couple of years, our group has expanded to 30 members.

Lise King, a member of the group and owner/manager of Kings Framing and Art Gallery offers weekly art lessons for adults, children and community clubs. She offers instructional classes from beginners to intermediate students and/or students that have been away from the arts for some time. These open studio classes include various mediums such as oil, acrylic, watercolour and drawings from graphite, charcoal, coloured pencils or ink.

Lise and her assistant Carol Toebes, run Children's Mixed Media art classes and this year are incorporating Home Schooled Kid's Mixed Media art classes. They introduce the children to different mediums from pencils to paints in conjunction with the basic fundamentals while exploring their

creativity.

Weekend workshops are also available. Special guest artists include members of our group or gallery: Robert Smith teaches brushed charcoal or watercolour, and Colleen Castonguay teaches Bob Ross, Watercolour, Pen &

Ink or acrylic, while Arlie Hoffman offers open studios, to

name a few.

Kings gallery also offers RV day trips to selected landscape destinations or museum attractions. Artists bring their camera's to capture the moment; some prefer plein air, while others sketch for references in the studio.

During the summer, the group offers free

workshops at "Art In The Park". This event is held outdoors during "The Summer In The Park Festival" in North Bay, Ontario. In 2010, classes include Bob Ross oil paintings, Jackson Pollock, Big Brush watercolour and Solucryl on Yupo. This event also offers local artists exposure and a venue to sell their artworks.

The Consolidated Artist Group of 7s members coordinates the gallery featured artist and/or group of artists four times a year. During this time,

the artist's work will be displayed on three featured walls including an open reception and posting on our website and blogs inviting the public to attend.

Linda Finn will be instructing. She will focus on composition, dynamic colour, found object squared and working in a series.

With such a colourful history, Cobalt presents endless possibilities for artists. Each day, a design challenge will be offered to participants. Using colour, texture, words and whatever else can be collected en route, participants will paint, print and assemble pieces that will reflect a personal view of Cobalt. There will be daily group critiques and discussions, demonstrations of techniques (as needed), with every effort made to help individuals.

Born in Parry Sound, Linda moved back to Northern Ontario in 1975 with her family and felt immediately that this place was home. The connection with the land allowed her to learn, experiment and grow as an artist. Since then, her work has been shown in over a hundred and fifty exhibitions and earned her election to the Canadian Society of Painters in Water Colour, the Ontario Society of Artists, the Society of Canadian Artists and the Northern Ontario Art Association. The recipient of many awards for her artwork, Linda has also received the Lescarbot Award for her volunteer efforts in the arts community, plus Ontario Arts Council grants for professional development.

Initially watercolour was her medium of choice, but printmaking, papermaking, textiles and mixed media now offer many more choices when developing a theme. "I am intrigued by curious combinations and situations that have meaning for me and also for the viewer."

Jane Kerr and Linda Duke travelled to Sudbury for Brian Atyeo's Weekend..Thanks Walden and Sudbury Clubs!
In the Pottery Shop Carmen taught one course, but broke her shoulder..not good! Anne Gagnon taught pottery to Kitimivik students, while Earl Niganobe taught them Racu. Earl took part in an Art Exchange show in Blind River, joining artists from Canada and Australia.

Our weavers are working steadily towards hosting Wassoon in 2012, also creating baskets for this Event. They meet monthly to do baskets, and almost live in the Weaving Studio!

Our Stained Glass area has expanded, as there are several glass artists now. Donna Kenny has switched to Pottery, along with much travelling!

The Viola Moody Award this year was won by Evelyn Vegeris, with Anne Gagnon as co-ordinator. The Purchase Award collection is on display at the Library between other Shows.

Four of our Wednesday artists joined for their first show at the Library. Titled "Two By Four", it showcased floral paintings by Jane Kerr, Judy Sampson, Yvonne Dickson, and Linda Duke. It was well received by the Public, and Library staff.

A new venture headed by Alexandra Gunther and Jane Kerr was the Summer Art Film series, with documentaries on famous artists, followed by short presentations and conversations. These were greatly appreciated, and will continue again. Due to extreme heat in our room, we were allowed use of a Learning in Retirement room, much more comfortable. Hopefully next summer there will be airconditioning of some sort for us

too! With our rent increased to \$450 plus HST monthly, we are due some attention! Our rent increase caused new membership fees from \$60 to \$75 (\$85 for NOAA artists), lockers went from \$5 to \$20, and workshops and rental to other groups also went up. Lots of changes!

The annual NOAA meeting was an adventure for Linda Duke (Rep) and Yvonne Dickson. A rock from a passing truck struck the drivers'side window, shattering it. Travel from Sudbury to Magnetawan without a side window was noisy and cold, but paintings were delivered! Clear vinyl and duct tape provided shelter during the rain, but driving was noisy! Vern from Mac Lang in Sundridge was their hero, finding a replacement window! All that and nobody from our Club was accepted in the Show! However, the hospitality and whole event were outstanding! Thanks!

Arts on the Trail has replaced the Studio Tour, with local locations, interactive events (a Tree of Life with food collected for the food bank..thanks Deb Elrose!), quest artist Richard Edwards and his workshop, live music at all locations, weavers demos at Civic Centre, plus a lot of fantastic work by artists and artisans. Interest in work by fibre artist Russ Mason led to having him do a Shibori dying workshop..several members had very blue hands, as well as scarves!

Boss Buys Lunch served up 365 plates, making 2 days of "slave labour" well worth it, netting around \$800 for our Club.

NOAA Feature Artist, Brigitte Bere



Brigitte Bere is one of the most talented multi-media artists in Northern Ontario.

Each medium in which she works demonstrates her skill in handling materials, an incomparable sense of design, a dynamic use of colour and a fascination with texture.

Brigitte was born on Leipzig, East Germany and escaped with her family 1952 to West Berlin. She arrived in Sudbury in 1978 to marry Scott Bere whom she had met at a Trade Show in West Germany.

I first encountered Brigitte's work – an exquisite marionette – which was included in a juried exhibition at a downtown gallery. Marionettes were her

forte for a number of years and these beautiful creations are found in many private collections.

Since joining the Sudbury Art Club in 1998, Brigitte has participated in many workshops and has expanded her repertoire of creative skills. Currently her visual ideas are expressed in printmaking, painting, collage and sculpture. Several regional galleries represent Brigitte. She has also exhibited with Four and Friends at Bruce Mines, the NOAA Annual Juried Exhibition and the Annual LaCloche Exhibition. She frequently receives awards for her entries.

There is a timeless quality to her best work. Her figures, both painted and sculpted are intriguing and mysterious and I suspect that in their creation she has been strongly influenced by her youth.

Two solo shows are in the near future: at Artists on Elgin in March and at the Temiskaming Art Gallery in September 2011. I encourage everyone to experience these visual feasts.





NOAA 55TH Annual Exhibition - Rules of Entry

DEADLINE TO RECEIVE FORM AND ENTRY FEES: JUNE 30TH, 2011 (See page 35 for more info)

Media

All two-dimensional artwork excluding photographs. Note that the annual colour and graphics shows are now combined into one Annual Juried Exhibition.

Time

All work must have been done within the last three years. It must be produced without the assistance of instruction. It must not have previously been exhibited in any of the NOAA exhibitions.

Originality

It must not be a copy in part or as a whole of another's drawing, painting or photograph. Your own photographs may be used as a reference. The use of manipulative photographic images in collage is now accepted.

Size

No minimum or maximum. Any painting which exceeds 33" by 38" framed (the size which can be accommodated by NOAA crates) must have its own crate supplied by the artist. Any damage incurred will be the responsibility of the artist. Any painting that exceeds 33" by 38" and does not have its own crate will be withheld from the jurors. Any small entries will be the responsibility of the artist to pack adequately.

Mounting and Framing

There will be no matting limits. It is the responsibility of the artist to present entries in such a way that the image, mat and frame are a coherent presentable unit. Pieces with soiled or damaged mats will be withheld from the jurors.

If artists are framing with plexiglass, it must be noted on the NOAA label to prevent any damage. All matted pieces must be securely framed and glazed for hanging.

Stretched canvas pieces may be submitted without extra framing as long as the edge of the canvas forms an integral part of the painting and the artist provides adequate means of support for transportation.

Note: These pieces should be protected front and back with cardboard, taped together, before being placed in the cloth envelopes. This packing should be labeled with name of Artist and Title of

piece so that it is reused to protect the artwork each time it is repacked for traveling.

Framed pieces must have a hanging wire and be securely framed according to framing standards (1/3 way down). No taping of glass for shipping. If possible, use plastic-covered wire.

Large pieces must have reinforcing wire on the back to keep sides from bowing and to offer more stability.

Single sheet art pieces may be mounted on board without additional matting if that method of mounting offers the desired result. However it must be professionally mounted to prevent slipping in the frame.

Diptychs and triptychs will be accepted, and be considered one work, but they must be joined together and the combined size of all pieces must not exceed the maximum allowable size.

NOAA Labels

NOAA labels must be affixed to the back of each submission. These labels are prepasted (just moisten and apply). Do not use any tape. If extra labels are needed, make photocopies and apply with glue.

Pricing

Before pricing, consider: the NOAA takes 10%; the club or gallery exhibiting your piece at the time of sale is entitled to take their standard commission. It is suggested that the minimum price be \$50.

Club Representatives

As representatives it is your responsibility to reject any pieces from your members that do not meet the requirements as indicated in the Rules of Entry.

Official Entry Forms

Collect information from your members and fill out the entry forms. Send the original to the convener, one copy to the treasurer and two copies to be used as your packing slips for shipping; one to be taped to the inside of the crate lid and the extra in the crate.

If you have more than one crate for your club, make additional copies of the entry form so that you can place two copies of the entry form in each crate; you must indicate on each which paintings are in each crate. Retain a copy for your files.

Have your entry forms to the convener by the deadline date.

Entry Fee

An entry fee of \$25 will entitle you to submit two paintings. The fee is to be paid to your club representative.

It is not to be submitted to the treasurer **on an individual basis**.

The club representative will send one cheque on behalf of all club members with the official entry form to the NOAA treasurer. Do not send individual cheques from each member. Send this in before the deadline.

Packing

Check to make sure each entry delivered to you meets the requirements. Pack the entries in the crate. Use additional packing materials to ensure the entries cannot slide around. Corrugated paper may be sufficient.

Place a copy of the official entry form on the inside of the lid. Tick off the paintings on this list to go with the crate. Place an extra copy of the entry form in the crate.

If all the paintings don't fit in one crate, please indicate which paintings are in the second crate. In the second crate, a photocopy of the official entry form must be taped to the lid with the paintings in this crate ticked off and with the indication that the other paintings are in the first crate. Also put an extra copy in this crate.

Crates

Send the crate to the convener **PREPAID**. The convener does not have to accept the shipment unless it is prepaid.
Unselected work will be returned COL-LECT to your club after jurying.

Sales

Artists whose paintings are sold during the tour of exhibition will not receive a cheque from the NOAA until after the purchase cheque has been cleared and the painting has been delivered to the purchaser. The NOAA will retain 10% on sales and any other percentage taken by galleries where the sale took place.

ALL ENTRIES MUST HAVE A CLUB CLOTH ENVELOPE FOR SHIPPING

Each entry should have its own club envelope with name and address of the club, not the individual artist's name.



SHIPPING THE CRATES

- NOAA Carrier of Choice is Manitoulin Transport and NOAA has a preferred rate with this carrier.
- 2. The NOAA account number with Manitoulin Transport is #028655. This number is to be included on all Manitoulin Transport pro bills. When you call Manitoulin Transport to arrange for pickup of your crate, they will require the approximate size and weight of your crate. Ask them for a rate quote and write the rate quote number on the shipping bill of lading. Request the NOAA Special Rate.
- 3. WHEN SHIPPING THE SELECTED SHOW PREPAID FROM ONE SITE TO ANOTHER the NOAA pays for the shipping. Ensure Manitoulin Transport staff include the NOAA account number in the PREPAID section of the pro bill. The invoices will be sent to the NOAA Treasurer for payment.
- 4. WHEN SENDING CLUB CRATES TO THE CONVENER FOR JURYING, the individual club is responsible for the shipping cost both ways.

Manitoulin Transport will send the invoice to the NOAA Treasurer. S/he will then send your club an invoice to reimburse NOAA for the shipping charge. Please pay this invoice as soon as possible.

- DO NOT INSURE (very costly), but put a TOTAL VALUE of contents of crate on the pro bill.
- 6. Telelphone the Receiving Club and advise of shipping date and when they can expect to receive the shipment. Keep a record of where the crates were shipped and when they should be there in case there is a crate lost or the exhibition convener doesn't receive the crate.
- 7. NOTICE TO ALL REPS: The combination locks on the shipping crates are now replaced with carabineers.

David has given lectures on Tom Thomson and his art across Ontario and continues to research the life and times of this mythic Canadian Artist. He was honoured in 2008, with the Ontario Association of Art Gallery's Educator Award.

Art Cunanan C.V.

Born in the Philippines and educated at the University of Santo Tomas in Manila, Art's pursuit of his passion began as a graphic artist for a leading newspaper and several advertising companies in Manila. In 1984, he was introduced to the Canadian scene by Zoltan Szabo, a well known artist and instructor. Since his Canadian introduction, his work has been accepted into juried exhibitions, private and corporate collections in Canada, United States, Europe, Asia, Australia and the Philippines. Represented by galleries at major cities in Canada, Cunanan has held many successful exhibitions. Some of his work has also been reproduced by Carlton Cards, Bradley Museum and Royal Insurance. In 1989, Art decided to devote his attention to painting full-time and started teaching workshops for various art groups and art schools. A popular art instructor, he has been teaching workshops across North America and Europe for the past 18 years.

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54th NOAA Show Jurors' Report Juror's Report Bobbi Haviland

The room vibrated with energy from 250 paintings, drawings and prints in a multitude of techniques and formats. It was a delicious dilemma - to help choose a travelling show of 40 pieces. A challenge given the skill, commitment and imagination being presented.

While a cohesive, focussed exhibit is the aim of curators, the exuberance and scope of the works in that room had to be honoured and brought together in a way that would show the considerable artistic force represented by the NOAA members.

That was my mission statement.

Juror's Report from John Anderson

It's always a privilege to be asked to jury an art show. The experience at NOAA 2010 was certainly that for me.

Assessing that many works and having to jury them down to a very small number to be hung makes the task quite challenging. When I arrived my fellow juror had already made an assessment of the show. I took the initiative of going through by myself and noting those pieces that met my criteria. We then compared notes. We agreed on a large number of works right away. This assures an unbiased approach to the process, and also confirms that our criteria were very similar, which you should expect. The range of work was vast in terms of materials, material handling, in subject matter, technical skills and the resulting quality of work. Criteria used to judge a show starts with composition in representational and non-representational work. They are the same in this respect. The successful presentation of an idea begins with composition. That in itself is an art.

The next aspect is more associated with how the artist brought together the materials to present an idea, a statement in the work. Materials handling is next. How well was the material handled. Clarity and confidence are the issues being looked for here. Subject matter does not really enter the picture.

Finally, the presentation of the work is important. A badly framed piece does affect how it is received but not before the other factors mentioned.

The interest in presenting your work for jurying and public display is to be considered, as is the range of materials an ideas. I have been jurried out of shows that I've previously won. Don't worry about a single result either positive or negative. It's a body of works from you that really counts. Keep up the enthusiasm. One of the great art teachers in the last 100 years is Charles Hawthorne. He said "I'm always a student, everything is a study".
