

NOAA President's Message 2013-2014

I want to take this opportunity to thank all of our sponsors. Your support for the arts in Northern Ontario is to be commended, and you are appreciated by all of us who are a part of the NOAA! Without your help, our ability to do what we do to encourage and promote the visual arts would be hampered in numerous ways!

With my mind presently on meeting the deadline for submissions for the bulletin, I especially want to express our appreciation to two companies who have consistently blessed us with financial assistance in producing our NOAA bulletin. These are Manitoulin Transport and Nickel Acme Printers, Inc. We also want to extend our gratitude to Brigitte Bere, not only for the donation from Nickel Acme for printing costs, but for the gift of countless hours of work that Brigitte and her staff have provided to us for the labour involved in putting the bulletin together beautifully! This has been going on for a number of years, and as this is Brigitte's last year doing our bulletin, I want her to know we are grateful!

I want to remind all of our member clubs that we have made a change in how registrations are to be handled for Cobalt Artists Colony, for this summer (and henceforth). As per usual, one cheque will be sent from each club that has members who have committed themselves to attending (by paying their registration fee to their club's treasurer). This cheque will be sent directly to our NOAA treasurer, rather than to the Cobalt Convenor, which saves a step. However, the main difference is that a club member may now make sure he/she has a spot reserved when the member has paid, by having the club treasurer notify the Cobalt Convenor immediately. This avoids the problem that has arisen in the past, when a club had to wait until very near to the deadline, in the event of other club members wanting to register then. This has sometimes meant that by the time some clubs tried to register their members, the spots were already taken.

A new development that I am personally very excited about is the establishment of a new opportunity for NOAA artists to gather for a week in the summer. This will be considerably different from the Cobalt Colony in format, and in purpose. Therefore, it should not be in way construed as competing with or displacing the Cobalt Artists Colony, which is a particularly valuable instructional experience that the NOAA has been providing our members for many years (and it is hoped, for many years to come). The new Plein Air Artists Colony will take place in a different location each year, which will hopefully make it more accessible to more members over the years. We are looking forward to the first gathering this summer on Manitoulin Island, with Christie Best Pearson organizing this for us. We will have a chance to do some plein air painting, explore the area, get acquainted with other artists, and renew friendships


with other members we may only see once or twice a year. We should be able to keep costs down as we won't be hiring an instructor. This will rather be a sharing and learning-from-each-other type of experience. Please look through this bulletin for Christie's article for more information.

Algoma Art Society (AAS) Report 2013

The year 2013 began with a 65th Anniversary Celebration of the Algoma Art Society. Historically the first organization meeting of the Society occurred on January 16, 1948. An exhibition by Society members entitled "For the Love of Art" was held at Frida Café and Art in downtown Sault Ste. Marie from January 10th to February 15th. Opening night was well attended with local dignitaries, current and past members and the general public. A special feature displaying and discussing the exhibition was shown on local Shaw Channel 10 with member Pat Baker being interviewed by Anne Gordanier.

In February members participated in a Bon Soo Art Exhibit with the theme 'Winter' displayed in the Art Gallery of Algoma foyer. Also in February, three members of the Algoma Art Society, Nora Ann Harrison, Theresa Woodcock and Judy Henderson, along with other local visual artists, participated in Common Strokes held in the Station Mall. Artistic skills were taught and demonstrated to the public. Theresa Woodcock demonstrated the use of acrylic inks and Nora Ann Harrison taught various watercolour techniques. Many of the public were fascinated.

The Algoma Art Society was very fortunate this year to receive a City Cultural Grant which helped finance a new website, an updated brochure and several workshops scheduled for early 2014.

Our new website (www.algomaartsociety.ca/) was launched at the end of July 2013. Rick Wark and Judy Henderson received training on editing. This new website can now be updated with BIOs and photos of members' art work and current, recent and upcoming events along with their photos. An Events Calendar is another plus on our new website. Currently 25 Algoma Art Society members have their BIO's and profiles on the website.

Copies of an updated glossy brochure, which were then displayed in strategic Sault Ste. Marie locations, were produced in June 2013, featuring photos of member's artwork, a history of the Algoma Art Society, the Society's historical connection to the NOAA and contact information.

Station Mall offered window space from June until October 31, 2013 where members' paintings were showcased along with information on the Algoma Art Society and the NOAA. One of the window spaces was at the former English Butler. Station Mall also provided that same empty store location in August 2013 to display the 40 paintings in the 56th NOAA Annual Touring Exhibition. Over 900 members of the public viewed this display between August 7th and August 18th. It received excellent publicity through articles by Brian Kelly of the Sault Star and an online Local2 article by Carol Smith. Brian Kelly featured Diana Blazek in his article and Carol Smith featured Hilkka Pellikka. The 56th NOAA included paintings by Algoma Art Society members Diana Blazek, Marilyn Mills and Hilkka Pellikka.

At our March 13th meeting members were wowed by guest artist Karen Nesbit's demonstration of the steps involved in the production of a monoprint using glass plates, oil paints and natural elements such as twigs, dried leaves and flowers. Photographer and member Gordon Stone did a Powerpoint presentation at our November 13th meeting where he spoke about his spiritual connection to his work. Writing and photographs were provided by Society member and writer Pat Baker. On Saturday, June 1st the "TODAY" pages featured Goulais River artist Lucie Gagnon who had an exhibition in Frida Café and Art at that time. Artistic profiles on Warren Peterson, Nora Ann Harrison, Doris Anne Ray, Mike Zavits and Zoey Wood-Salomon were featured in the Saturday, August 17th edition and Marilyn Mills, Hilkka Pellikka, Rick Wark, Rose Sundaram and Wendy Easterbrook were featured artists in the Saturday, August 24th edition. On Saturday, November 23rd the "TODAY" section featured member Ellen Van Laar who lives along Lake Superior and had an exhibition of her work on display at the Art Gallery of Algoma. These special features provided an excellent opportunity for the public to learn about our talented members.

Several members of the Society attended figure drawing sessions at Sault College with a local group entitled "The Underground Group". We are very privileged to have such a group locally. Drawing from a live model offers such a great opportunity to improve our drawing skills.

We were very fortunate to have six new members join the Algoma Art Society in the fall of 2013 which included members of the Batchewana Bay Art Guild, Jeanne Dumas and Ellen Van Laar. Also very welcome is Carol Smith, writer and photographer for Local2, a local online news website, Jacqueline Janisse, who creates very unique works of art, Nancy Caldwell, a watercolour painter who just moved to the Sault from Winnipeg and Stefanie Moran from Brimley, Michiaan.

Judy Henderson attended the 57th Annual NOAA meeting and Official Opening in Kirkland Lake in September 2013. Works by members Anne Laidlaw, Marilyn Mills, Lotte Steube and Hilkka Pellikka were selected as part of the 40 paintings. Highlights were Anne Laidlaw winning the Muriel Backstrom Memorial Award for her pastel entitled "Canopy" and Lotte Steube receiving her NOAA letters.

On Saturday, November 9th the Canadian Bushplane Heritage Centre held the 1st Annual Arts and Crafts Show. It turned out to be a success with 82 vendors taking part. Warren Peterson, Zoey Wood-Salomon, Livio Ubaldi and Jacqueline Janisse of the Algoma Art Society participated.

The year ended with a Christmas Social held at the Gliss Restaurant. After a delicious meal, members and guests participated in a fun Christmas gift exchange organized by Zoey Wood-Salomon.

Members look forward to plans for two upcoming workshops being held in early 2014, one with instructor and member Diana Blazek in Pan Pastels in January and a 2-Day Watercolour Workshop with Gordon MacKenzie as instructor being held in February.



This year there were 14 awards to choose from and one honourable mention. We felt the jurors did a great job.

Kirkland Lake Arts Club is fortunate to have so many willing workers. One year before the 2013 exhibition a committee was formed and met once a month to plan the event.

This has been another stressful year for our community. The old Mall was demolished, a new site was blasted in preparation for another plaza, the Library was moved to White Mountain Academy building, the Inquiry made us a media focus. Our Club continued as we have over the years!

Easier time access to the building made evening and weekend workshops well attended, with several new members joining. Linda Finn''s Creative Watercolour classes had an exhibition in the Civic Centre Lobby, showing well all the techniques learned. Linda also taught us Collagraphy, resulting in an enthusiastic new group. Barbara Braunohler took a fall, which has slowed down her teaching, but she continues with her Coffee Klatch, getting us to talk art, and show our work in this monthly critique.

The NOAA Show in the Gallery At The Centre was well appreciated ..and looked so good! It also brought the public to the Gallery, a bonus for all. The Centre''s Open House in March highlighted all the creative groups, and brought in more new members. Now there is a waiting list for lockers! Our Club also has a part on the signage on the building''s exterior, more publicity.

Creative Connections 3 saw 22 writers and artist/artisans collaborate, in groups of 2 or 3. The results were exhibited for a month in the Centre''s Lobby, on grid stands now available. This mix of multimedia work is inspiring and much enjoyed by the public and all involved.

Marjorie Boutilier again oversaw the Viola Moody Awards, with Ben Holden taking first, Sarah Burgess as second, and Chloe Hamelin as third place. It was so exciting to have 16 out of 26 of our collection retrieved from the Library after the collapse, plus 3 belonging to the Library! Many, many thanks to the demolition crew who were able to locate these irreplaceable items without hazard! A few had broken glass, and scuffed frames, but the artwork was fine! So much was lost, it is comforting to have

these saved.

A few of the painters actually went out to Depot Lake to paint en plein air ..a first for some, and good fun. Jacque Grummett was artist in residence at Pukaskwa Park, doing demo and class in Basketry. Our President John Price coaxed us to participate in the Canada Day Parade ..good thing, as there were very few other floats. Sheila Darbyshire got each group to do a poster representing their studio, with members in the back of a pick-up truck ..we are mostly seniors after all ..but Hilda Ross, dressed in beret, smock and waving a paintbrush, made sure we were noticed! We participated in the Artisans Market, a new venture to promote local talent. John is a very persuasive President, and gets us involved!

The town needed uplifts, and the **Downtown Revitalization Committee** created a Children''s Banner Contest, with such creative entries (Linda Finn''s idea, of course!), and the Downtown Art Project, which saw 22 submissions, of which 7 were shortlisted, and 2 were chosen. Susan Krupp painted 3 panels featuring prominent figures in our mining history. This was installed on the side of the Deli in the lower plaza. Linda Duke''s 8x12 painting depicting a Northern scene with her poem imprinted was installed on the side of Dr Lennon''s Chiropractic building. Comments have been very positive ..we were good guinea pigs for this as other businesses want to be involved in future! This sure brightens up the place!

Potters were thrilled to receive a Trillium Grant for a new Kiln. There is a lot going on in the Pot Studio! Arts On The Trail had many visitors to all 3 Studios, with members doing demonstrations.

Linda Duke was so sad to miss the NOAA meeting .. first time .. but also misses her mother-in-law who passed away then. It was rewarding to have 2 pieces selected out of 4 sent. Maggie Foran and Linda Finn got in, with Linda receiving the Sheila Langlois Award.

Boss Buys Lunch did well, though there were no goodies left over for workers to share! We will have to bake much more next year if we want leftovers! Darla Hennessey is a great chairperson, and Jacque Grummett keeps volunteers on track. Darla''s Children''s Christmas Store was good, even though our weavers could not produce items they had planned. The Civic Centre finally got funds to have the HVAC system redone ..weavers and potters froze, painters and stained glass workers sweated, seasonal discomfort, with weavers out of their space for 5 weeks or more. This also prevented them from having work for our Christmas Show. Joanne Nicholls coordinated this year to The Nutcracker Suite theme, with very good results. Local writers participated in Writers Open Mic, with member Kathleen Burke taking People''s Choice. Gloria Hansen and her group Algoma Wildflowers played at TGIF, and for our potluck. Norlyn Purych is taking classes in the Soo, and was in a Show there at the Art Gallery. Linda Finn had her War Letters Show in the Timber Village Museum in Blind River. This Show would be at home in the National War Museum ..hopefully someday!

We lost a member, but just to Newfoundland. Judy Sampson was a treasured member of our Wednesday Wonders painters. Kathleen took over her job as Librarian, Beverley Sheils replaced Anne Mc Farlane as Secretary. Let''s hope this next year will be less stressful, but still full of artistic pleasures.



It was a very snowy but beautiful drive out into the countryside to Sharon's home, where lights twinkled, the fireplace threw out warmth and the tantalizing smells of dinner wafted through the air. 
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NOAA Feature Artist, Judy Henderson

Retired now, Judy credits her career as a graphic designer at Sault College with drawing on her interest to work in various positions with the AAS and NOAA over the years.


She had graduated from the facility with an Honours Diploma in Advertizing Art and Graphic Design and was awarded the Art Faculty Award for the highest grade point average.

She's been an active member of the Algoma Art Society in Sault Ste. Marie since 1982 and has been the club's corresponding secretary since then as well.


From 2003 until 2007, Henderson was NOAA Website convenor and continues to serve as NOAA Club Representative, a position she has held since 2006.





NOAA PLEIN AIR ARTIST COLONY


The first annual PLEIN AIR ARTIST COLONY will be held in

Each participating member demonstrates in their choice of medium, and answers any questions from the public. We have had excellent feedback from the community on this feature of our shows. As well, we have a community project where visitors can try their hands at creating art themselves. We have had large community canvases for them to paint on, and more recently, large surfaces on which they may draw, learning various shading/texturing techniques from our members. The result of these projects are on display at the Ben Moxam Community Centre in Lively.

As a club, we have a strong interest in exposing children

NOAA 58th Annual Exhibition - Rules of Entry

DEADLINE TO RECEIVE FORM AND ENTRY FEES: JUNE 30TH, 2014 (See page 35 for more info)

Media

All two-dimensional artwork excluding photographs. Note that the annual colour and graphics shows are now combined into one Annual Juried Exhibition.

Time

All work must have been done within the last three years. It must be produced without the assistance of instruction. It must not have previously been exhibited in any of the NOAA exhibitions.

Originality

It must not be a copy in part or as a whole of another's drawing, painting or photograph. Your own photographs may be used as a reference. The use of manipulative photographic images in collage is now accepted.

Size

No minimum size. The maximum size is 33" x 38" framed. Any small entries will be the responsibility of the artist to pack adequately.

Mounting and Framing

There will be no matting limits. It is the responsibility of the artist to present entries in such a way that the image, mat and frame are a coherent presentable unit. Pieces with soiled or damaged mats will be withheld from the jurors.

If artists are framing with plexiglass, it must be noted on the NOAA label to prevent any damage. All matted pieces must be securely framed and glazed for hanging.

Stretched canvas pieces may be submitted without extra framing as long as the edge of the canvas forms an integral part of the painting and the artist provides adequate means of support for transportation.

Note: These pieces should be protected front and back with cardboard, taped together, before being placed in the cloth envelopes. This packing should be labeled with name of Artist and Title of piece so that it is reused to protect the artwork each time it is repacked for traveling.

Framed pieces must have a hanging wire and be securely framed according to framing standards (1/3 way down). No taping of glass for shipping. If possible,

use plastic-covered wire.

Large pieces must have reinforcing wire on the back to keep sides from bowing and to offer more stability.

Single sheet art pieces may be mounted on board without additional matting if that method of mounting offers the desired result. However it must be professionally mounted to prevent slipping in the frame.

Diptychs and triptychs will be accepted, and be considered one work, but they must be joined together and the combined size of all pieces must not exceed the maximum allowable size.

NOAA Labels

NOAA labels must be affixed to the back of each submission. These labels are prepasted (just moisten and apply). Do not use any tape. If extra labels are needed, make photocopies and apply with glue. Include framed size or dimensions.

Pricing

Before pricing, consider: the NOAA takes 10%; the club or gallery exhibiting your piece at the time of sale is entitled to take their standard commission. It is suggested that the minimum price be \$50.

Club Representatives

As representatives it is your responsibility to reject any pieces from your members that do not meet the requirements as indicated in the Rules of Entry.

Official Entry Forms

Collect information from your members and fill out the entry forms. Send the original to the convener, one copy to the treasurer and two copies to be used as your packing slips for shipping; one to be taped to the inside of the crate lid and the extra in the crate.

If you have more than one crate for your club, make additional copies of the entry form so that you can place two copies of the entry form in each crate; you must indicate on each which paintings are in each crate. Retain a copy for your files.

Have your entry forms to the convener by the deadline date.

Entry Fee

An entry fee of \$25 will entitle you to submit one painting. The fee is to be paid to your club representative.

It is not to be submitted to the treasurer on an individual basis.

The club representative will send one cheque on behalf of all club members with the official entry form to the NOAA treasurer. Do not send individual cheques from each member. Send this in before the deadline.

Packing

Check to make sure each entry delivered to you meets the requirements. Pack the entries in the crate. Use additional packing materials to ensure the entries cannot slide around. Corrugated paper may be sufficient.

Place a copy of the official entry form on the inside of the lid. Tick off the paintings on this list to go with the crate. Place an extra copy of the entry form in the crate.

If all the paintings don't fit in one crate, please indicate which paintings are in the second crate. In the second crate, a photocopy of the official entry form must be taped to the lid with the paintings in this crate ticked off and with the indication that the other paintings are in the first crate. Also put an extra copy in this crate.

Crates

Send the crate to the convener **PREPAID**. The convener does not have to accept the shipment unless it is prepaid. Unselected work will be returned COLLECT to your club after jurying.

Sales

Artists whose paintings are sold during the tour of exhibition will not receive a cheque from the NOAA until after the purchase cheque has been cleared and the painting has been delivered to the purchaser. The NOAA will retain 10% on sales and any other percentage taken by galleries where the sale took place.

ALL ENTRIES MUST HAVE A CLUB CLOTH ENVELOPE FOR SHIPPING

Each entry should have its own club envelope with name and address of the club, not the individual artist's name.

SHIPPING THE CRATES

- NOAA Carrier of Choice is Manitoulin Transport and NOAA has a preferred rate with this carrier.
- 2. The NOAA account number with Manitoulin Transport is #028655. This number is to be included on all Manitoulin Transport pro bills. When you call Manitoulin Transport to arrange for pickup of your crate, they will require the approximate size and weight of your crate. Ask them for a rate quote and write the rate quote number on the shipping bill of lading. Request the NOAA Special Rate.
- WHEN SHIPPING THE SELECTED SHOW PREPAID FROM ONE SITE TO ANOTHER the NOAA pays for the shipping. Ensure Manitoulin Transport staff include the NOAA account number in the PREPAID section of the pro bill. The invoices will be sent to the NOAA Treasurer for payment.
- WHEN SENDING CLUB CRATES TO THE CONVENER FOR JURYING, the individual club is responsible for the shipping cost both ways.
 - Manitoulin Transport will send the invoice to the NOAA Treasurer. S/he will then send your club an invoice to reimburse NOAA for the shipping charge. Please pay this invoice as soon as possible.
- DO NOT INSURE (very costly), but put a TOTAL VALUE of contents of crate on the pro bill.
- 6. Telelphone the Receiving Club and advise of shipping date and when they can expect to receive the shipment. Keep a record of where the crates were shipped and when they should be there in case there is a crate lost or the exhibition convener doesn't receive the crate.
- NOTICE TO ALL REPS: The combination locks on the shipping crates are now replaced with carabineers.
