

NOAA President's Message 2011-2012

This past year has been a challenging year in my position as president, as the NOAA enters its 56th year with a major change to the submission (from 2 entries to 1 entry per person) to our Annual Juried Exhibition. After thorough discussion at our annual meeting in September 2011, the board members and club representatives voted unanimously in favour of one entry per person for \$25.00. This result was then brought back to the grassroots of the 15 clubs and each club voted on this to ratify the decision. The outcome was: 12 clubs in favour limit the entry to 1 painting for \$25.00, with 3 clubs opposed to such change. It is now in effect for the 56th Annual Juried Exhibition for a "trial run" and will be revisited during our upcoming September 2012 annual meeting. The report of the convenor of the hosting club and representatives of the members clubs, the jurors' comments and discussions of people present at the meeting, will determine, if this is also applied to the 57th Annual Juried Show, or if there is another way possible.

The reasons for the change were multi faceted. We are limited to accepting 40 paintings, because we are restricted having only 2 crates to ship them in. Those crates will be shipped to 12 locations (max) each year. They will only hold that many works comfortably. The comments of the jurors over the years were always to the affect, that they could select another 40 for a second show. Since our membership has increased to now 430 (approx) members within the 15 clubs, this change would give more people an opportunity to be selected. The other aspect was, that the workload for the Convenor of the hosting club has always been confronted with the daunting aspect of accepting up to 250 paintings, arriving from 15 clubs.

For all of you, who were not in favour, let us see, what the result of this change brings to our Annual Juried Exhibition. I hope that all of those members, who have entered their work in past years, will participate again. To those of you, who have never entered their work, this is a great opportunity! Some members felt comfortable with the 2 entries, because they had 2 chances. Some members might have difficulties identifying their "best" work. If the basic design, media and presentation had been well thought out, the next level, the "story telling" aspect needs to be present. The painting needs to stand out amongst the "crowd". When I first started to enter the NOAA juried competition, I submitted 2 works in watercolour. They were well executed, lovely (I thought), flawless in their presentation, but didn't make it into the show. I didn't understand the jurors' decision and made it a point to see the show when it arrived in Sudbury. It became clear to me, that the paintings selected stood out in some way, were different in some respect. And yet, when too many pieces of art survive the first round of the jurying process, the jurors have to come to terms with the restriction of only choosing 40 paintings in the end.* (*see page 36) In the 2 art clubs that I belong to, the Sudbury Art Club and the Walden Art Club, we have, from time to time, a silent critique night after our business meeting. Members are invited to bring in paintings for this silent critique. The members present then are asked to write their comments about the work on a small critique sheet to such members that present their work. They write out what the artist did well and what could be improved. This has helped many of us to complete what would have been other wise not completed as well, or even thrown out. If you are in doubt, let others see your work and in the end it will help you to decide which one you should choose. Good luck and happy painting to all of you.

Algoma Art Society AAS - Annual 2011-2012 Report

The year 2011 began with a Two-Day Oil and Acrylic Landscape Workshop with instructor David Read held on January 18 and 19, 2011 in the Emmanuel Church Hall. Thirteen Algoma Art Society members and two non-members attended. It was a fun learning experience for the majority of those who attended.

Various art shows were held throughout the year. As a Bon Soo Event in February 2011, 16 Society artists displayed their work in a vacant store area provided by the Station Mall. As part of this event several members put on one hour workshops in various mediums for the viewina public. On March 10, 2011 six of our female members participated in an arts and crafts show and sale held at the Canadian Bushplane Heritage Centre as part of International Women's Week. Our club gained several new female members who were also participants that day. Following the theme "Northern Light" various members had one or two art pieces accepted in a juried exhibition held in the Project Room of the Art Gallery of Algoma from July 21st until October 2nd, 2011. As well two art shows and sales were held in Station Mall, one in an empty store location on May 27th and 28th and another one in the Dennis Street Court on October 21st and 22nd. A Christmas Art Show and Sale was held at the John Rhodes Community Centre on Saturday, December 2nd. Different

participants made excellent sales at these events.

Due to the work by our president Eileen Halfpenny our club received an \$1100.00 City Grant in May 2011. This grant was approved to be used for the creation of a new website for the Algoma Art Society. Website designer, Katie Alton was hired for this project. Katie also upgraded our Society's logo, keeping the basic design, but giving it a new look.

Several members were fortunate to be interviewed in their studios and featured on our local television station, Channel 10 throughout the year. They spoke about what inspired them to do their art work and displayed various examples of their work.

The Canadian Bushplane Heritage Centre offered their Gift Shop as a location to display the 54th NOAA Touring Exhibition from late August to early September 2011. Later during November the front entranceway of the Bushplane Centre was offered to display the 55th NOAA Touring Exhibition. An official opening of the exhibit featuring saxophone music and refreshments was held during the evening of Thursday, November 3rd. With more than 100 members of the public in attendance, it was one of the most successful openings of the NOAA held in Sault Ste. Marie.

Commencing in November 2011 up to 10 Society members per month are invited to display a painting near the entranceway of the Sault Ste. Marie Casino. Because of this exhibit several members have been fortunate to sell a piece of their work.

Sault Star Journalist and club member Pat Baker did a featured article in the December 3rd Sault Star concerning the fascinating history of the Algoma Art Society and their involvement with the Group of Seven. Also mentioned was our club's long involvement with the NOAA. In the article were photos that included A. J. Casson and A.Y. Jackson of the Group of Seven and photos from the 55th NOAA Touring Exhibition. Our Society was very fortunate to be featured in that article.

55th AGM - getting down to work

The Manitoulin Fine Art Association has been growing by leaps and bounds now at 60 members, we were thrilled to host the NOAA 55th Annual Exhibition. A committee was established shortly after the 54th show to review the NOAA black book and begin our plans. Nicole Weppler the Curator of the Gore Bay Museum/Art Gallery came on board securing space for the event in Gore Bay as well as finding volunteers to work at the show which was held at the Gore Bay Community Hall September 17 – 29th, 2011. Ellen Lewis was given the task of finding iurors. We were fortunate to have David Huff from Owen Sound and Art Cunanan from Collingwood as jurors. September came quickly, after months of phone calls, letters, scheduling, photocopies, organizing, we were uncrating 243 works of art, wow - what great fun. It is so inspiring to see the work produced by Northern Ontario artists.

On September 14th our jurors put in a very long day and agreed that more than one show of 40 could have been chosen. The young David Huff and seasoned Art Cunanan made an excellent pairing.

Our Friday evening social was held on September 16, 2011 at the Lyons Memorial United Church in Gore Bay. The event was well attended. 

NOAA 56TH Annual Exhibition - Rules of Entry

DEADLINE TO RECEIVE FORM AND ENTRY FEES: JUNE 30TH, 2012 (See page 35 for more info)

Media

All two-dimensional artwork excluding photographs. Note that the annual colour and graphics shows are now combined into one Annual Juried Exhibition.

Time

All work must have been done within the last three years. It must be produced without the assistance of instruction. It must not have previously been exhibited in any of the NOAA exhibitions.

Originality

It must not be a copy in part or as a whole of another's drawing, painting or photograph. Your own photographs may be used as a reference. The use of manipulative photographic images in collage is now accepted.

Size

No minimum or maximum. Any painting which exceeds 33" by 38" framed (the size which can be accommodated by NOAA crates) must have its own crate supplied by the artist. Any damage incurred will be the responsibility of the artist. Any painting that exceeds 33" by 38" and does not have its own crate will be withheld from the jurors. Any small entries will be the responsibility of the artist to pack adequately.

Mounting and Framing

There will be no matting limits. It is the responsibility of the artist to present entries in such a way that the image, mat and frame are a coherent presentable unit. Pieces with soiled or damaged mats will be withheld from the jurors.

If artists are framing with plexiglass, it must be noted on the NOAA label to prevent any damage. All matted pieces must be securely framed and glazed for hanging.

Stretched canvas pieces may be submitted without extra framing as long as the edge of the canvas forms an integral part of the painting and the artist provides adequate means of support for transportation.

Note: These pieces should be protected front and back with cardboard, taped together, before being placed in the cloth envelopes. This packing should be labeled with name of Artist and Title of

piece so that it is reused to protect the artwork each time it is repacked for traveling.

Framed pieces must have a hanging wire and be securely framed according to framing standards (1/3 way down). No taping of glass for shipping. If possible, use plastic-covered wire.

Large pieces must have reinforcing wire on the back to keep sides from bowing and to offer more stability.

Single sheet art pieces may be mounted on board without additional matting if that method of mounting offers the desired result. However it must be professionally mounted to prevent slipping in the frame.

Diptychs and triptychs will be accepted, and be considered one work, but they must be joined together and the combined size of all pieces must not exceed the maximum allowable size.

NOAA Labels

NOAA labels must be affixed to the back of each submission. These labels are prepasted (just moisten and apply). Do not use any tape. If extra labels are needed, make photocopies and apply with glue.

Pricino

Before pricing, consider: the NOAA takes 10%; the club or gallery exhibiting your piece at the time of sale is entitled to take their standard commission. It is suggested that the minimum price be \$50.

Club Representatives

As representatives it is your responsibility to reject any pieces from your members that do not meet the requirements as indicated in the Rules of Entry.

Official Entry Forms

Collect information from your members and fill out the entry forms. Send the original to the convener, one copy to the treasurer and two copies to be used as your packing slips for shipping; one to be taped to the inside of the crate lid and the extra in the crate.

If you have more than one crate for your club, make additional copies of the entry form so that you can place two copies of the entry form in each crate; you must indicate on each which paintings are in each crate. Retain a copy for your files.

Have your entry forms to the convener by the deadline date.

Entry Fee

An entry fee of \$25 will entitle you to submit two paintings. The fee is to be paid to your club representative.

It is not to be submitted to the treasurer **on an individual basis**.

The club representative will send one cheque on behalf of all club members with the official entry form to the NOAA treasurer. Do not send individual cheques from each member. Send this in before the deadline.

Packing

Check to make sure each entry delivered to you meets the requirements. Pack the entries in the crate. Use additional packing materials to ensure the entries cannot slide around. Corrugated paper may be sufficient.

Place a copy of the official entry form on the inside of the lid. Tick off the paintings on this list to go with the crate. Place an extra copy of the entry form in the crate.

If all the paintings don't fit in one crate, please indicate which paintings are in the second crate. In the second crate, a photocopy of the official entry form must be taped to the lid with the paintings in this crate ticked off and with the indication that the other paintings are in the first crate. Also put an extra copy in this crate.

Crates

Send the crate to the convener **PREPAID**. The convener does not have to accept the shipment unless it is prepaid.
Unselected work will be returned COL-LECT to your club after jurying.

Sales

Artists whose paintings are sold during the tour of exhibition will not receive a cheque from the NOAA until after the purchase cheque has been cleared and the painting has been delivered to the purchaser. The NOAA will retain 10% on sales and any other percentage taken by galleries where the sale took place.

ALL ENTRIES MUST HAVE A CLUB CLOTH ENVELOPE FOR SHIPPING

Each entry should have its own club envelope with name and address of the club, not the individual artist's name.



SHIPPING THE CRATES

- NOAA Carrier of Choice is Manitoulin Transport and NOAA has a preferred rate with this carrier.
- 2. The NOAA account number with Manitoulin Transport is #028655. This number is to be included on all Manitoulin Transport pro bills. When you call Manitoulin Transport to arrange for pickup of your crate, they will require the approximate size and weight of your crate. Ask them for a rate quote and write the rate quote number on the shipping bill of lading. Request the NOAA Special Rate.
- 3. WHEN SHIPPING THE SELECTED SHOW PREPAID FROM ONE SITE TO ANOTHER the NOAA pays for the shipping. Ensure Manitoulin Transport staff include the NOAA account number in the PREPAID section of the pro bill. The invoices will be sent to the NOAA Treasurer for payment.
- 4. WHEN SENDING CLUB CRATES TO THE CONVENER FOR JURYING, the individual club is responsible for the shipping cost both ways.
 - Manitoulin Transport will send the invoice to the NOAA Treasurer. S/he will then send your club an invoice to reimburse NOAA for the shipping charge. Please pay this invoice as soon as possible.
- DO NOT INSURE (very costly), but put a TOTAL VALUE of contents of crate on the pro bill.
- 6. Telelphone the Receiving Club and advise of shipping date and when they can expect to receive the shipment. Keep a record of where the crates were shipped and when they should be there in case there is a crate lost or the exhibition convener doesn't receive the crate.
- NOTICE TO ALL REPS: The combination locks on the shipping crates are now replaced with carabineers.

55th NOAA Show Jurors' Report

If it was only about wandering around the room and picking out artwork that we personally liked, it would have been an easy task. A quick look at the art, and a fantastic lunch; what more could you want from a couple of days on Manitoulin island in the fall? This would also have been be a big misconception about jurying this art show (although the food was fantastic); it was not vacation, but an intense and grueling process that took us hours and hours to complete. Jurying a show would be an excellent learning opportunity for every professional artist. Until one has juried an exhibition, with the quantity and quality of work that was presented to us, and tasked with the job of creating a succinct and meaningful critique on each art work, related to what could have been improved and what was successful, does one truly understand how draining, both physically and emotionally, jurying a large art show can be. It was a mammoth job.

It was an honour to jury the Northern Ontario Art Association's 55th Annual Juried Exhibition. It was a challenge that both of us took very seriously. We did our best to push personal preference aside. We examined each work of art from a technical point of view, evaluating the handling of the materials with which each artist chose to work. Were the basic principles of design used effectively? Were the proportions, lighting and composition accurate? We considered if the artist went beyond technical expertise, to explore the subject matter in a way that would be make his or her work stand outthe WOW factor. We also considered the artists' final choice related to their artwork, the presentation (framing) and if it enhanced their concept.

Over all, we were awestruck by the wide variety and excellence of the work that the artists submitted, and saw it as a snapshot of the thriving and talented artistic community in the North. We were impressed and overwhelmed by number of NOAA members who took up the challenge to submit work for competition. The creation of any artwork is a very personal endeavour, and it is important to remember that artists do not create work to win prizes or to sell, but to portray their creative passion. We hope that no one will be discouraged from continuing on their own artistic journey for the sake of not getting one of the very few coveted spots in this show.

That being said, it was a competition, and we had been given the task to whittle down the 245 submitted works to the 40 works that would become the traveling show. For a piece to make it into the final exhibition, we felt that the artwork needed to embody a unified idea with a focused subject matter. The artist had to make skilled use of the principals of design and composition. The maker had to show technical competency, in using materials and techniques, to convey the subject without drawing notice to the materials themselves. Additionally, the final presentation had to enhance the artwork, not draw attention to itself. All these criteria help to create an outstanding artwork.

The outcome of this competition was the result of the very high standards set by the artwork that your fellow artists had submitted.


