




NOAA MANDATE


NOAA President's Message 2017-2018

Algoma Art Society (AAS) 2017

Algoma Art Society began 2017 with a new NOAA Representative. Nancy Caldwell was born in Wisconsin, emigrated to Canada with husband Pat in 1976 where they resided in Winnipeg for 35 years. In 2013 they moved to Sault Ste Marie to be closer to their daughter, husband and two grandchildren. She brings years of art experience which she enthusiastically shares with the local active art community. She has enjoyed the new opportunities and connections of her new role as NOAA Rep.

Along with a new year came new creative possibilities as well as new challenges. The research and preparations to be able to submit art pieces digitally began. The cost savings for transportation will be of great benefit to all clubs. The preparation for events to follow also began.

In January The Art Gallery of Algoma held it's juried Winter Festival of Arts (open to all). "Honourable Mention" was awarded to AAS member Cherie Ahvenniemi (The Colour Stable / Watercolour). The yearly event was a great success.

On April 8 an invitational International Exhibit hosted by Alberta House Gallery was held in SSM, Michigan. The "Sault North Algoma", was chosen as the name and the event was nicely attended with a sale for Mike Zavits. Forty-one pieces were on display with twelve members submitting. April 29 the club held an art show and sale at the Station Mall. It was well publicized with Brian Kelly interviewing Josie Jones as a featured artist in the Sault Star. Ten









members participated which made for a diversified display of art and was enjoyed by all.

In celebration of Canada's 150th, a Mosaic containing 572 small tiles displaying the artistic talents of Sault Ste Marie's young and old (some from AAS membership) was unveiled. It is presently hanging in the lobby of City Hall.

In September Nancy Caldwell and

Wendy Easterbrook returned from the NOAA meeting in Timmins full of infectious enthusiasm for the future. Our club is hoping to host in 2022.

November saw the Art Gallery of Algoma hold a display of NOAA's 61st Annual Juried Exhibition paintings with five being from our club; Phyllis Dorman, Lotte Steube, Ken Hagerman, Wendy Easterbrook (Edna Hosking Award), Gary Manzo (Manitoulin Transport Award) . The paintings were on display for two weeks . "Keep your Eye on the Ball (Best of Show)" by artist Margot Cormier Splane of Timmins was sold locally. Overall impression of the show was that it was full of light and colour and varied in subject matter.

As the year came to an end we continue to reflect on our times together:

- -Marcella Whillans demonstrated the possibilities of creating impressive art cards from old paintings.
- -Gary Manzo played a video of the Art Institute of Chicago .
- -A hands on night of choosing the most suitable mat in preparation for framing your work took place with Nancy Caldwell sharing her tips and advice.
- -Nancy also shared her photos and stories from Newfoundland and tips on painting icebergs.

The active group of artists and crafters who meet regularly at Burks Falls have had an excellent year. There are 29 members, who travel from the entire Almaguin area, encompassed from Bracebridge all the way up to Powassan. There are monthly meetings, and most Wednesdays, throughout the whole year, many members meet to share creative time together, to participate in classes & trainings, given by teachers and BFACC members.

We are delighted to have a 2-story store, just off the main street in Burks Falls, where we can display and sell our creations. Monday started off with welcoming words from Tina A.D. Sartoretto (mayor of Cobalt). Instructor Marc Gagnon taught two days of screen painting in watercolour which he developed himself after he replaced the screen in his studio door. The third day Marc taught acrylics using a Mosaic approach in landscape. Marc was presented with a thank you card from the group.

Thursday we had Bruce Cull teaching the art of the "Signifier and the Signified". The afternoon was a time to finish up and a little plein air painting with the new ideas.

This year we had an Open House on Friday from 10am to 12. Many participants showed off their work and some went to paint plein air. The Golden Age club was cleaned up and we finished by 2pm.

The Creative Minds Art Association (CMAA) 2017





61st NOAA Annual Juried Exhibition Conveners' Report

The Porcupine Art Club began planning a year in advance of the event. We were fortunate to have professional help in co-hosting from the Timmins Museum: NEC staff.

Club members were eager to create a welcoming atmosphere. Many helped: to sew gift bags, solicit donations and awards, arrange catering, find jurors, organize the jurying, prepare social events, and lay out the items to be printed for the exhibition.

Ted O'Connor and Catharine Cribbs were co-convenors on behalf of the Porcupine Art Club with Karen Bachmann on behalf of the Timmins Museum: NEC.

Early on, we hit an unexpected snag in finding jurors. Working from a list of nearly thirty credible jurors, we found that an invited juror would initially agree to the job, then back out after looking at a map. It took many invitations before we found satisfactory jurors. Then, as we found out too late, it would require the jurors to spend two days if they were to fill out the NOAA critique forms. We had not pre-planned a second day so the forms were incomplete which caused disappointment in many clubs. At the annual meeting, it was agreed that in future the host club must discuss with the jurors if it would be a one-day or two-day commitment. We felt that our jurors, Anita Spadafore and Cesar Forero, made a thoughtful and professional selection and that they provided comments as much as was possible in the one day.

As 2017 was the first year for digital entry, we were relieved to have many thumb drives arrive throughout June, ahead of the deadline. Most photographs were excellent; most were set up as requested. A few shots needed re-sizing which we did and then we organized the photos onto a master thumb drive for the jurors.

Jurying on July 13th went smoothly. As hoped, it was physically easier and less costly than handling perhaps one hundred and fifty actual works. A description of (a) how we organized the work for the jurors and (b) how the jurying was set up and carried out can be accessed by contacting Ted O'Connor or Catharine Cribbs. We have full, detailed reports on file.

After the jurying, we advised the clubs as to which artists were selected for the 61st. This left two months for artists to frame their works and gave time for our club to prepare the exhibition brochures, wall labels, and posters.

Artwork for the 61st would be delivered on September 15th in time for the conference opening on September 16th. Hence, we planned some activities for members who came to deliver work on Friday. In the afternoon, PAC member, Nicky Alexander, lectured and conducted a walk-through of the stained glass windows at St. Matthew's Anglican Cathedral. This was followed by a 'tea' in the cathedral hall with a figure drawing session led by Catharine Cribbs. The models were PAC member Karina Douglas- Takeyesu and her husband Mits Takeyesu-Douglas, resplendent in their wedding kimonos.

Friday evening saw us gathered for a wine and cheese hosted by the Timmins Museum: NEC and a preview (sans awards) of the 61st show in the stunning new black gallery.

On Saturday morning, we convened early at the Timmins Museum: NEC for breakfast and the annual meeting. Business was discussed and decisions were made by a full slate of NOAA representatives with many club members sitting in. All joined in a delicious lunch catered compliments of jointly the NOAA and the Timmins Museum: NEC. After lunch, the NOAA representatives picked up the returned works from the 60th show.

On Saturday afternoon, the gala event at the Timmins Museum: NEC began with the public reception for the 61st show. PAC presented awards to our very special NOAA artists before a large audience. The Timmins Museum: NEC's expertise in publicizing the event certainly brought in the viewers! It was a delight and honour to celebrate the newly renovated space with our exhibition.

After one week on display, the 61st show was carefully packed for shipment to Burks Falls, the first stop on the 2017-2018 tour. Our committee breathed a great sigh of satisfaction!

61st NOAA Show Jurors' Reports

It was a great privilege to be a juror for NOAA 2017.

Something new and very difficult for me was to send a critique note to every artist submitting. We tried to make the comments as constructive as possible. Although some artists will receive a short note you can be sure that each one was reviewed very carefully. It is very difficult to evaluate or make comments regarding an artist's artwork without seeing several of his/her pieces. For this selection, we have only been able to make comments on the piece submitted and how this piece looks on a JPEG format. Therefore, the comments we have made might not apply to any other of your paintings.

In relation to the digital submissions, I think that most pieces were well represented. As an artist myself, I always like to ask my family and friends to look at my JPEGs to make sure that the image I am sending is the most accurate to my work.

Cesar Forero

This was the first year jurying was done digitally and although certain aspects of the entries were difficult to judge, i.e. scale, texture and sometimes even tones, the method was less problematic than I had imagined.

As a juror, I was able often to agree with my colleague about various aspects of the work and if we didn't agree then we were able to revisit the image and review our assessments until we settled on a judgement acceptable to both of us.

On the whole, the images sent to the NOAA were well presented and varied in subject and style. Boldness in execution was less evident in the works and the jurors rewarded those who either technically or imaginatively pushed the envelope. In judging an important factor that we considered was the mastery of technique.

I thank all those who participated in the competition. Their willingness to share their work is appreciated by all.

61st NOAA Report on Digital Jurying

Preparations of thumb drives: numbered images were collated by one club member onto a master thumb drive. Extra copies of the thumb drive are needed with artist names and club names removed.

Jurying day, early July. Two jurors with four club members to help as needed. Digital projector and screen are needed. **Note:** The four club members should not enter any work for jurying.

- Jurors viewed all entries, one by one, on a screen. One club member handled the projector. The jurors paid attention to the size information which was shown on each work on the screen, asking for work to be blown up or made smaller. They asked to zoom in on areas to see texture and brush work. The jurors were given **thumbnail** print outs to refer to, as well as the works on the screen. We had a tape measure to show the actual size of a work. It was suggested that we could in future draw out a few common "frames" with a marker on white paper, ie 16x 20, 24x30, etc, and have these up on the wall for reference.
- v The jurors viewed each piece for a second time and then began their deselection, each juror saying "yes" or "no" to each piece. If they disagreed, the work was left for a third round. Pieces that received two "no" comments were deleted from the thumb drive.
- v The jurors viewed the smaller selection; discussed the works; and deselected more pieces until the show was pared down to the appropriate size of between 35 and 40 works. The selected works were reviewed and awards were chosen. This took the entire morning.
- In the afternoon, all works were viewed one by one and comments were given by each juror for each piece. Three club members, working in rotation, recorded the comments on the NOAA forms. The jurors spent about 2 minutes discussing each entry. This took the entire afternoon, into the early evening. If the NOAA scoring system is used, a **second day** is required by the jurors.
- v The following day, two club members sorted the comment sheets, placed them in individual envelopes, and mailed them in





Our newest member Charlotte Greenwood was pleasantly surprised to have her painting chosen for the juried exhibition or her very first entry.


We are very busy preparing for the 62nd Annual Juried Exhibition and are looking forward to September.

We wrapped up 2017 with a Christmas lunch party at Average Joe's, overlooking Trout Lake in all its winter glory, enjoying the company of good friends, and looking forward to the challenges and pleasures of 2018.











Porcupine Art Club (PAC) 2017

The year 2017 was a milestone for the Porcupine Art Club, which turned 70 in September. It was also a busy one for the club, as it was our turn to host the 61st NOAA Juried Exhibit at the Timmins Museum: National Exhibition Centre. The club began making plans for the NOAA Annual General Meeting after five members attended the 2016 Meeting in Haileybury. This year marked the first time digital entries were submitted for judging, and thanks to the efforts of Vice-President Ted O'Connor and new club member Michael Damini, an efficient workflows system was established for organizing the 140+ image files for presentation to the jurors.

The club held a themed exhibit, "In the Deep Mid-Winter", at the Black Spruce Gallery in February. The weather had been quite mild in January, which made us wonder if there would be any snow on the ground by the time the show went on display. Fortunately, the reliability of Timmins' weather prevailed, and opening night took place on a blustery evening with flurries. Unknown to us at the time, our exhibit was the last time the club would be featured at Black Spruce Gallery, as it closed its doors on December 23rd 2017. This loss to the community was the result of a substantial rent increase for the gallery.

Spring brought with it more ups and downs. On March 29th, some club members attended the 50th Anniversary of the C.M. Shields Centennial Library's opening in South Porcupine. At the celebration, a 4'x8' mural painted by club members was unveiled. The mural depicted children reading under a tree surrounded by various woodland creatures, both real and imaginary. The mural is now on permanent display over the children's area of the library.

April was marked by the death of artist Gayle Ballantyne at the age of 66. Gayle had joined the club a couple years earlier, but she and her artwork were well-known in the community for many years. Her watercolours and sketches depicted buildings and scenes around the Timmins area, and were in many homes and offices. In 2009, she opened her studio *Gayle's Mining Art and Drawing Room* in South Porcupine where in addition to selling her artwork, she held art classes for students ages 8-91. Gayle's legacy continues online through the website https://gaylesdrawingroom.com, where visitors can see her portfolio and purchase reproductions of her artwork. Gayle had also painted a flying fish on the library mural.

May and June saw a change of course in one set of plans and a new community project. The club's themed show "Dark in the Light", which would have been on display at the Timmins Museum in May was postponed to December, because the museum underwent renovations over the summer for the addition of a Digital Creator North multimedia lab for youth 14-19, revamping of the gallery space, and an eventual artist/maker space. The building would also be home for two other City Departments: Tourism and the Timmins Economic Development Corporation.

A new community project came in its place: Great Book Boxes. Modelled on the Little Free Libraries, the Great Book Boxes arose from some memorial funds given to the local book club, who then partnered with the Timmins Public Library, the Timmins High and Vocational

School shop class, The Porcupine Art Club and several other interested members of the community to create 4 library boxes, three of which were modelled after landmark buildings in the community (the McIntyre Headframe, a Hollinger House, and a Miners' Gold Vault), while the fourth was modelled to depict a birdhouse. Three boxes would be in public locations, while the fourth would be on the grounds of Pinecrest Elementary School. The PAC was responsible for the painting the boxes. All four boxes were on display in the front window of the former Tweed & Hickory during the last week of June during the Downtown B.I.A. Urban Park and Stars & Thunder.

Summer was the season of our Sunday Open Studio sessions, which began on the Canada Day weekend and ran to October 01st, the Culture Days weekend. In addition to Open Studio, some members of the PAC went out to Bannerman Park in Porcupine, for two Thursdays in July and two in August as part of the Summer Concert series. 4' x 4' Masonite panels painted white were brought out, along with leftover water-based house paints and brushes, and the public was invited to paint on the panels during the concerts.

September was a busy month Welcome to Timmins Night, the NOAA Annual General Meeting and 61st Juried Exhibition. Three PAC members had their works selected: Shafik Al-Hamdani, Nicky Alexander, and Margot Cormier Splane. The show stayed in Timmins for one week before heading out on tour for the year.

October and November were busy preparation time for "Dark in the Light", the opening of which would also be our 70th Anniversary celebration. Before the show opened formally, club members took part in the Museum's Annual Holiday Arts and Crafts Sale, which ran on December 01st and 02nd. On December 07th, we opened our show and celebrated with a big birthday cake. "Dark in the Light" had 52 works and an additional special piece on loan from a private collection. This piece was an oil painting done by the late Evelyn Rymer back in 1947, Ev was one of the founding members of PAC. The show was displayed in the new "Grey Gallery" at museum until January 02nd, 2018. 2018 looks like it will be busy as well with the 62nd NOAA annual; Juried show hosted by Moonbeam.

We look forward to another year of painting, new projects, and new exhibit opportunities.

Brigitte Bere showed the painting process "painting with alcohol inks".



NOAA Digital Art Submission 62nd Annual Meeting and Exhibition

Step One: To photograph 2 dimensional works:

Lighting: use natural light outdoors, not in direct sunlight. Best to use the north side of a building, in shade, on a bright day.

Situate your camera level with the centre of your art work, at right angles to the work.

Take your photo before framing (i.e. without glass) and before signing.

Step Two: Preparing the memory stick:

Download the image, then crop it so that nothing but the image itself is visible.

Resize the image to 4000 ppi along the longest edge.

Name your image as follows: #, club initials, last name, first name, title, medium, unframed dimensions (inches).

e.g. First image: #1, PAC, CRIBBS, CATHARINE, HIGH FALLS, WATERCOLOUR, 30x22", use the same format for second. third, etc.

Place club entries, with consecutive numbers, on one memory stick. Entries are to be listed with corresponding numbers on NOAA Handbook Entry Form #2 (this will be revised soon to reflect digital submissions). Be certain that the numbered information on the entry form corresponds with the numbered

entry on the memory stick.

Step Three: Submitting the digital entries and information:

Memory stick plus one copy of NOAA Entry Form #2 to be sent by Express Post to the host club in a padded envelope; the deadline is June 29th.

Entry fee of \$25 per entry, one entry per member, and one copy of Entry Form # 2 to be sent in one cheque to the NOAA treasurer, deadline, June 30th.

One copy of Entry Form #2 to be kept for club records.

Notes: We have chosen a high resolution, 4000 ppi to ensure good viewing and consistency when images are projected for the jurors. This is a recommendation from a professional photographer. If your work has been photographed with a signature visible, we will mask the signature using a computer 'block' for viewing by the jurors.

Jurying will be in mid-July, with the results made known by late July to allow time for framing.

Chosen work is to be delivered by 1:00 p.m. on Friday, September 15th to set up for display and for jurors to finalize awards before the opening on September 16th.

NOAA 62nd Annual Exhibition - Rules of Entry

Deadline to receive digital entries, forms, and entry fees: June 29th, 2018.

(See page 34 for more information)

Media - All two-dimensional artwork excluding photographs. Note that the annual colour and graphics shows are now combined into one Annual Juried Exhibition.

Time - All work must have been done within the last three years. It must be produced without the assistance of instruction. It must not have previously been exhibited in any of the NOAA exhibitions.

Originality - It must not be a copy in part or as a whole of another's drawing, painting or photograph. Your own photographs may be used as a reference. The use of manipulative photographic images in collage is now accepted.

Size - No minimum size. The maximum size is 33" x 38" framed. Any small entries will be theresponsibility of the artist to pack adequately.

Mounting and Framing - There will be no matting limits. It is the responsibility of the art to present entries in such a way the image, mat and frame are a coherent, presentable unit. Pieces with soiled or damaged mats will be withheld from the jurors. If artists are framing with Plexiglas, it must be noted on the NOAA label to prevent any damage. All matted pieces must be securely framed and glazed for hanging.

Stretched canvas pieces may be submitted without extra framing as long as the edge of the canvas forms an integral part of the painting and the artist provides adequate means of for transportation.

Note: These pieces should be protected front and back with cardboard, taped together, before being packed in the cloth envelopes. This packing should be labelled with name of Artist and Title of piece so that it is reused to protect the artwork each time it is repacked for travelling Framed pieces must have a hanging wire and be

securely framed according to framing standards(1/3 way down). No taping of glass for shipping. If possible, use plastic-covered wire.

Large pieces must have reinforcing wire on the back to keep sides from bowing and to offer more stability.

Single sheet art pieces may be mounted on board without additional matting if that method of mounting offers the desired result. However, it must be professionally mounted to prevent slipping in the frame.

Diptychs and triptychs will be accepted, and beconsidered one work, but they must be joined together and the combined size of all pieces must not exceed the maximum allowable size.

NOAA Labels - NOAA labels must be affixed to the back of each submission. These labels are pre-pasted (just moisten and apply). Do not use any tape. If extra labels are needed, make photocopies and apply with glue. Include framed size or dimensions.

Pricing - Before pricing, consider: the NOAA takes 10%; the club or gallery exhibiting your piece at the time of sale is entitled to take their standard commission It is suggested that the minimum price be \$50.

Club Representatives - As representatives it is your responsibility to reject any pieces from your members that do not meet the requirements as indicated in the Rules of Entry.

Official Entry Form - Collect digital photographs and information from your members and fill out the new digital art submission forms. Send one copy of the form and your fees to the treasurer. Send one copy of the form with the memory stick to the convenor. Keep one copy for your records. Do this prior to the deadline date of June 30th, 2017.

If you have more than one crate for your club,make additional copies of the entry form so that you can place two copies of the entry form in each crate. You must indicate on each which paintings are in each crate. Retain a copy for your files.

Have your entry forms to the Convenor by the deadline date.

Entry Fee - An entry fee of \$25 will entitle you to submit one painting. The fee is to be paid to your club representative. It is not to be submitted to the treasurer on an individual basis.

The club representative will send one cheque on behalf of all club members with the official entry form to the NOAA Treasurer. Do not send individual cheques from each member. Send this in before the deadline.

Packing of Accepted Entries for Clubs Using Crates - Check to make sure each entry meets the requirements. Pack the entries in the crate. Use additional packing materials to ensure the entries can not slide around. Corrugated paper may be sufficient. Place a copy of the entry form listing the accepted entries on the inside of the lid. Place an extra copy of the form in the crate. If all the paintings do not fit in one crate repeat the process with a second crate.

Crates of Accepted Entries - Send the crate to the convenor PREPAID. The convenor does not have to accept the shipment unless it is prepaid. Empty crates will be returned COLLECT to your club after the opening of the annual exhibition.

Sales - Artists whose paintings are sold during the tour of exhibition will not receive a cheque from NOAA until after the purchase cheque has been cleared and the painting has been delivered to the purchaser. The NOAA will retain 10% on sales and any other percentage taken by galleries where the sale took place.

ALL ENTRIES MUST HAVE A CLUB CLOTH ENVELOPEFOR SHIPPING. Each entry should have its own club envelope with name and address of the club, not the individual artist's name. NEW: INCLUDE THE SIZE OR DIMENSIONS OF SUBMITTED WORK ON ENVELOPE LABEL.

CRATES TO BE SHIPPED TO MOONBEAM COMMUNITY CENTRE FOR THE 62nd ANNUAL JURIED EXHIBITION

SHIPPING THE CRATES:

- NOAA Carrier of Choice is Manitoulin Transport and NOAA has a preferred rate with this carrier.
- The NOAA account number with Manitoulin Transport is #028655. This number is to be included on all Manitoulin Transport pro bills. When you call Manitoulin Transport to arrange for pickup of your crate, they will require the approximate size and weight of your crate. Ask them for a rate quote and write the rate quote number on the shipping bill of lading. Request the NOAA Special Rate.
- When shipping the selected show prepaid from one site to another, the NOAA pays for the shipping. Ensure Manitoulin Transport staff include the NOAA account number in the PREPAID section of the pro bill. The invoices will be sent to the NOAA Treasurer for payment.
- DO NOT INSURE (very costly), but put a TOTAL VALUE of contents of crate on the pro bill.
- Telephone the Receiving Club and advise of shipping date and when they can expect to receive the shipment. Keep a record of where the crates were shipped and when they should be there in case there is a crate lost or the exhibition convener doesn't receive the crate.
- NOTICE TO ALL REPS: The combination locks on the shipping crates are now replaced with carabineers.
- Works for digital jurying to be sent in prescribed format on memory sticks via Canada Post Express Post service by June, 29th, 2017. To: Ms. Debbie Rousson, 20 Champlain Crescent, Kapuskasing, Ontario P5N 3A9.
- Art work to be delivered by hand, courier, or freight to: Studio 93, Moonbeam Gallery, 93 St. Aubin Street, Moonbeam, Ontario P0L 1V0 before 1:00 p.m. on Friday, September 14th, 2018.
